ORDER:

In order to provide various Government / other services at the door steps of Citizens through Single Window system, to enhance transparency & accountability in delivery of Government services to the Citizens and ensure seamless delivery of Navaratnalu, Government have established Village and Ward Secretariats (VWS) in the State, vide G.O. first read above. Now the Secretariat system has become a backbone for implementing all flagship programmes of the Government.

- 2. The results of Government programmes/schemes come out in the form of indicators of the Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs).. The Village and Ward Secretariats are the focal points that translate Global SDGs into local actionable tasks at the grassroot level. In order to ensure that all SDGs are effectively implemented at the local level by the VWS, the following instructions are issued
 - (a) The Mandal level supervisory officers of functionaries at Village Secretariat and Municipal Commissioners in case of Ward Secretariat shall monitor the programmes that pave the path for achievement of Sustainable Development Goals. The Global Sustainable Development Goals should be translated into local actionable tasks. The details of the Mandal level supervisory officers is given in Annexure 1.
 - (b) Data updation has to be done regularly and it should be reviewed on monthly basis by the Secretaries/Heads of Department /Collectors. For data updation, the information in the SDG Portal maintained by the Planning Department and the data from Consistent Rhythms would be synchronized to avoid multiple sources of information coming from the grassroots. The Planning Department would ensure that this is done forthwith and used to prepare presentations for review of Hon'ble Chief Minister.

- While monitoring the SDGs, with regard to the eight initial set of indicators consisting of improving the Enrollment ratio and attending to anemic mothers or malnourished children, etc., the reports should also cover the individuals/households not covered by the system like mothers not coming to anganwadis, children not enrolled in school, and so on. For getting the baseline data, quick survey of house holds should be done by Village/Ward Volunteers and this data needs to be updated from time to time. This would be supervised by the Panchayat Secretaries/Data Entry Secretaries in the Village & Ward Secretariat working under the technical control of the Mandal Statistical Officer. In general, the DES shall provide technical support at every administrative unit level to the V&WS Department. The monthly Survey has to be completed by 10th of every month beginning with November 2022.
- All Secretaries, Principal Secretaries, Special Chief Secretaries and Heads of Departments shall inspect at least one Village & Ward Secretariat every fortnight and share their feedback and observation to Special Chief Secretary to Government, Village & Ward Secretariat Department and Secretary to Government, Planning Department. They will consolidate and make presentations to Chief Secretary during 3-5 p.m. on every second and fourth Wednesday of every month. The standard presentation format for the Chief Secretary to Government / Chief Minister Office shall be based on the formats given in Annexure-3 and prepared by the Special Chief Secretary to Government, Village & Ward Secretariats/Secretary to Government, Planning Department and communicated to the Chief Secretary/Chief Minister's Office as well as shared with all Secretaries and Heads of Department by 7 Nov 2022.
- (e) In order to avoid duplication of visits by senior officers, allocation of secretariats will be done by Village & Ward Secretariat Department. The Village & Ward Secretariats Department would prepare the schedule for all upto 31 March 2023 for all Secretaries/HoDs and communicate to all by 7 Nov 2022 in the format given in Annexure-2. The Special Chief Secretary to Government, Village & Ward Secretariats in consultation with the Secretary to Government, Planning Department shall also prepare a standard inspection format in digital/paper form by 7 Nov 2022 and communicate to all Secretaries/HoDs in the State. The inspection would focus on the eight indicators, gradually expanding to 20 by April 2023.

Sir,

Sub:- SDGs- Ensuring data flow on 8 Priority Indicators from VWS level - Reg.

It is informed that the Government is giving highest priority to Sustainable Development Goals(SDGs) and in particular to the 8 Priority Indicators. The Chief Secretary and the Chief Executive to Hon'ble CM are conducting reviews on a regular basis and the progress is being appraised to Hon'ble Chief Minister.

2. As integration/digitalization of data on these 8 indicators pertaining to the departments of Health, Women Development and Education is in progress and development of an integrated APP by the VSWS department is likely to take some time (about 10-15 days), the data flow in the prescribed formats will continue to be manual and should originate from the Village/ Ward Secretariat level.

- 3. As suggested by the Chief Executive to Hon'ble CM, the ASO(stationed at Mandal level) shall ensure that data on all these 8 indicators is obtained once in a Fortnight through the Digital Assistants in the VWSs concerned to the Mandal. Since the Chief Executive to Hon'ble CM has scheduled his next meeting with us on the 12th of this month, it is essential that the data flow (manual) from the VWSs should start immediately so that the Assistant Statistical Officer (ASO) can in turn compile the mandal abstract and forward it to the Chief Planning Officer through the Divisional Dy. Statistical Officer, stationed in every Revenue Division.
- 4. This calls for specific instruction/direction from the VWS department to all the functionaries in the VWS across the State. It is therefore requested to suitably direct the Digital Assistants in all the VWSs to obtain/compile required information(including the information on Secretaries/HoDs visit to VWS) at the VWS level and make it available to the ASO concerned so that we would be ready with the complete information(District-wise) in the prescribed formats.

ORDER:

India is a signatory to the UN Development framework on Sustainable Development Goals. Andhra Pradesh is one of the States that has adopted this global development agenda and aligned its annual budget with the SDGs. The AP State is committed to achieve the 17 Goals by the year 2030. For this a comprehensive SoP has been developed and is under implementation. The first part of the SoP contains the State Indicators Framework (SIF) consisting of 475 indicators, particularly *Navaratnalu* group of schemes (nearly 100 indicators). The orders deals with the second part as set out in G.O. read above.

- 2. In order to monitor these indicators a portal has been developed by the Planning Department, which is the nodal department coordinating the SDGs at State level. The portal provides for data entry for 475 SDG indicators including the 115 indicators monitored by the NITI Aayog. Data entry/updation and monitoring the progress will be done in the SDG portal https://apsdg.ap.gov.in.
- 3. Nodal Officers have been identified in all the line departments to handle the SDGs at the State level. These departmental Nodal Officers shall take a proactive role in respect of data entry and updation and in extending support not only to the officers in their departments but to the districts as well. Goal-wise committees would be established at the State level with the Secretary of the Coordinating Department being the Chair. On the lines of the State level Committee, Goal-wise committees at the district level would be set up for each of the 17 Goals of SDGs. The Chairman would be the District Collector and the respective District Officers of the Coordinating department would be the Goal Coordinating Officer with the CPO as the Member-Convener and other concerned HoDs as members. The CPO would be responsible for data entry in the portal.

- 4. In order to ensure steady progress towards goal achievement, periodical reviews should be done as given below: -
 - I. The 115 indicators would be reviewed at least once a month by the Chief Secretary. The Secretaries would review once a fortnight and the Heads of Departments once a week. All the reviews would use the data on the portal. The District Collector shall hold a review meeting at least once in fortnight with district HoDs and identify the key areas where progress is slow.
 - The geographical unit for monitoring progress on the 475 indicators would be the Village Secretariat and Ward Secretariat (VWS). The District Collectors shall ensure that targets are drilled down to the level of VWS.
- III. Wherever, the proportionate target has not been achieved, the review would identify the reasons, scheme wise, in terms of inputs flow of funds, availability of human resources, etc. as well as the activities connected to the scheme components and take action. For this, the second part of the SoP would be made use of.

Using the Portal

- 5. <u>State level:</u> The Planning Department shall give necessary guidance to the line departments at State level in the following ways:-
 - The User ID and Passwords already provided to the Departments shall holds good.
 - The Departments shall regularly enter State level data for all the indicators concerned to their departments by 8th of every month in the Portal.
 - It also needs to be ensured by the State HoD that the data entered by the districts in respect of these indicators is correct and the achievements entered are in sync with State level data.
 - The departmental nodal officer after ensuring the correctness of the data entered by districts shall give final concurrence. After this (pressing save button), the data will freeze for further updation. Once the data is in freeze stage, data can be modified/changed only upon getting clearance from the Planning department.
 - The Nodal Officers of the departments shall bring the updated status to the notice of the Secretary/HoD concerned so as to present the latest status in the Secretaries/HoDs by the Chief Secretary every month.
 - The NITI Aayog accesses the data for compilation of the SDG index from some defined websites. It would be the duty of the secretaries/Heads of departments that the Nodal Ofcers enter the

data once a month. The DES would personally see the updation in all these website and give a monthly report to the Secretary (Planning) and quarterly report to the Chief Secretary.

- 6. <u>District level:</u> At the district level, the Chief Planning Officer (CPO) will be the Nodal Officer assisting the District Collector in respect of SDG data entry, updation and report generation at the district level. The broad roles and responsibilities of the officers at district level are as follows:
- The User ID and Passwords already provided to the Districts shall holds good.
- The District Collector shall appointment Nodal Officers for each of the department concerned with SDGs.
- Before furnishing the information to the CPOs, the nodal officer shall ensure that the information is in line with the targets (proportionate targets in respect of monthly monitor of indicators and annual targets for non-periodic or annual set of indicators).
- The key activities that push the SDG performance up need to be identified.
- The Nodal officer of the line departments in districts (relating to SDGs) shall authenticate the information to be entered in the portal before 8th of every month. In case of any clarification, he shall interact with the State Nodal Officer concerned.
- The CPO after scrutinizing the data for its correctness shall ensure data updation in the SDG Portal by 10th of the same month. He will have the flexibility to revise/ modify the data entered till he/she presses the 'commit' button. He will also identify the key concerns and appraise the District Collector on the areas that require special attention.
- The District Collectors shall attend the Video Conference which will be held in 2nd week of every month by the Chief Secretary with complete information and definite action plan in respect of each indicator of concern.
- The information culled out from the Portal shall only be reviewed at the State level.
- 7. The Director of Economics and Statistics (DES) of the Planning department, with technical assistance from the APSPDS, would be responsible for maintaining the portal and generating reports for periodic reviews by all Secretaries/HoDs/Collectors.

- 8. The Secretary, Planning Department would ensure that the Monitoring System outlined above is implemented. The Secretary (Planning), would send monthly dispatches to all departmental Secretaries/HoDs and District Collectors informing them of the progress towards achievement of proportionate and annual targets. Most important, uploading the information in the relevant websites used by the Niti Aayog would be monitored by the DES.
- 9. The Special Chief Secretaries/Prl. Secretaries/Secretaries, HoDs concerned and all the District Collectors are requested to adhere to the guidelines indicated above and thereby ensure continuous progress on the SDGs.

ORDER:

In the G.O.s read above, Government have developed a SoP for localization of SDGs and institutionalized a robust monitoring framework for SDGs and *Navaratnalu* at State and District levels. This order deals with the third part of the SoP which is connected to capacity building of functionaries at multiple levels in the State. Several rounds of orientation meetings have been organized in the presence of the Chief Secretary with the Secretaries/ HoDs at the State level and District Collectors/JCs/Mandal/Municipal level officers and staf at the District level. The focus of these sensitization workshops was on understanding the SDGs, articulation of the connection of programmes (and components) to the targets set out in the 475 indicators in the SIF.

- 2. The APHRD and the SIRD would be the lead agencies for training of all officers and employees connected to implementing the SoP. The demarcation of tasks between the APHRD and the SIRD and the broad methodology is given below:-
 - The AP HRD will be responsible for imparting training for the State level officers, viz., Secretaries to Govt., HoDs, District Collectors/JCs and other State level Officers.
 - The State Institute of Rural Development (SIRD) shall impart training for all other officers and staff – division, mandal, village/ward.
 - The Planning department shall share the material used for evaluating programmes of State/ District level schemes on SDGs with the two institutes.
 - All training sessions would be anchored by an academic and Secretary/HoD of the department dealing with that particular SDG.
 - Each Session would be for 40-45 minutes duration and would consist of instructions by the trainer as well as classroom activity.
 - About 475 indicators have been mapped to the 17 SDGs. In turn, each indicator has been mapped to schemes. For each scheme, the training institute would develop logic model and create teaching material based on the logic model.
 - The training material would consist of pre-session reading package, PowerPoint presentations, FAQs, case studies, etc.
 - The training would be based on the hybrid mix of face-to-face and virtual teaching - model.
- 3. Another unique part of the methodology is obtaining Feedback on the trainings from the participants and ploughing it back into capacity building. This would lead to continuous midcourse corrections in training material and teaching in order to cater to the contextual and

individual training needs of ofcers. The two training institutes - AP HRD and SIRD shall obtain feedback from the trainees every three months of their training and use it as a to upgrade the teaching materials. Such a continuous upgradation of training is called the **feedback-feed forward** framework. The feedback questionnaire should contain the trainees' views on whether the training is useful in delivering their duties better, relevant to their job chart, need to further upgrade his/her skills, suggestions for additional topics, etc. This would lead to individualized and contextualized type of training, also called the **bespoke model**.

- 4. An annual training calendar would be prepared for the APHRD and SIRD during March of every year and sent to GAD/Planning department before 01 April of every year for approval by the Chief Secretary.
- 5. Government have recognized the importance of collaboration with National/International institutes of repute for experience sharing and adoption of best practices. The APHRD would develop partnerships with International agencies such as UN, World Bank, etc. for capacity building of officials at all levels.
- 6. The Spl.CS (VWS/ PR&RD / MA&UD) are requested to guide the DG, HRD and Director, SiRD to meticulously formulate and organize capacity building sessions as indicated above for all levels of officers in the State.
- 7. The Secretary (Planning) with the Director (Planning) would be responsible for monitoring the roll-out of the Capacity Building Programme by the DG, HRD and Director, SIRD.
- 8. The APHRD and SIRD would start the training from 03 April 2022.

ORDER:-

The government is committed to achieve the milestones envisaged under the UN-sponsored Sustainable Development Goals (SDG) within the timeframe of year 2030. The State level and District level administrative machinery has accordingly been geared up to handle the development challenges. The government has ensured that the Annual Budget 2021-22 was SDG-Centric. The NITI Aayog, Government of India has been releasing the SDG India Index performance rankings every year for all the States/UTs and advised the States to institutionalize a robust framework to regularly monitor the progress at State level and District level under the identified indicators cutting across the 17 SDGs.

Keeping the importance of the matter in view, Government decided to 2. restructure and setup an SDG monitoring unit headed by the Secretary to Government, Planning department in place of the VMU with the existing staff as detailed below:-

ORDER:

India is a signatory to the UN Development framework on Sustainable Development Goals. Andhra Pradesh is one of the States that has adopted this global development agenda and aligned its annual budget with the SDGs. The AP State is committed to achieve the 17 Goals by the year 2030. In order to achieve SDGs before 2030 and improve the standings of the State in the SDG India Index, the Hon'ble Chief Minister has desired preparation of a complete and detailed set of activities that push up performance on each SDG and to put these in the form of Standard Operating Procedures (SoP). In the SoP, existing programmes /schemes would be mapped to SDGs and the targets on various SDGs would be disaggregated and implemented at the Village and Ward (VWS) level. Only activities (and corresponding indicators) which can be best done at higher levels would be entrusted to the higher levels - district/state. This process of reverse delegation would lead to localization of SDGs.

- 2. In tune with this the Planning Department have prepared Standard Operating Procedures (SoPs). The first part of the SoP consists the following :-
 - (a) a State Indicator Framework (SIF) consisting of 475 indicators arising from the 17 SDGs. These 475 indicators also contain the 115 indicators used by the NITI Aayog to prepare the SDG index as well as about 100 indicators connected to the *Navaratnalu* programme

(b) Programmes mapped to indicators, and

(c) a portal to monitor the progress on achievement of targets on the indicators by all departments.

- 3. In the second part of the SoP, the departments have to do the following:-
 - (a) identify the programmatic activities that contribute to achievement of objectives on the indicators,
 - (b) decide on the level where targets setting/monitoring has to be done, starting with the VWS level and moving up to the State/District. This is the **drilling down** of the SDGs and
 - (c) use the portal to monitor progress on targets set on SDG indicators at periodic intervals at the State / District / VWS levels as well as take corrective action wherever progress is slow.
- 4. The third part of the SoP is the orientation and continuous training of officers at the state/district/mandal/village levels by the APHRDI and the SIRD. For this, the training institutions would prepare and implement an annual calendar of training of officers for multiple levels (State/District/Village and Ward Secretariat).
- 5. It has been decided to monitor the 115 indicators used by the NITI Aayog to rank States, the Planning Department has already completed the first part of the SoP and the details are given in the following four types of formats:
- Master format (Format-1): Complete set of 115 indicators cutting across 16 SDGs with details on nature of indicator, scheme mapping, source of data, State rank, score, best state score as per SDG India Index 2020-21 report of the NITi Ayog, URL, coordinating/supporting department's name.
- Format-2: List of 115 indicators with specification of type (monthly or annual).
- Format-3: List of 68 indicators for which data shall be entered every month and can be monitored at State and District levels on a monthly basis.
- Format-4: List of 47 indicators for which data will be entered on annual basis or whenever there is revision of data.
- 6. The formats are appended as Annexure I,II, III and IV respectively to this order. The departments should use the above formats for monitoring as well as preparing the second part of the SoP.
- 7. For the remaining indicators (360), the Planning Department would prepare the four formats and communicate to all the Departments as well as place on the portal before 31 March 2022.
- 8. The NITI Aayog accesses the data for compilation of the SDG index from some defined websites. It would be the duty of the Secretaries/Heads of departments that the Nodal Officers enter the data once a month. The Director of Economics and Statistics (DES) would be responsible for rolling-out of the SoP and personally ensure that information is updated in all these websites every

month and submit a monthly report to the Secretary (Planning) and quarterly report to the Chief Secretary.

- 9. The Secretary (Planning) would also organize quarterly Workshops with NITI Aayog to sensitize all departments on accessing the websites and updating information. The first workshop would be held in April 2022.
- 10. The Special Chief Secretaries/Prl. Secretaries/Secretaries, HoDs concerned and all the District Collectors would implement all activities related to the SoP as outlined above with immediate effect.

- (ii) for the expression "Category(3)Deputy Director including Chief Planning Officer the expression "Category(3) Deputy Director" shall be substituted.
- 2. In Rule (3), in the table there under,
- (i) in column No 1 in Category (2), for the expression "Joint Director", the expression "Joint Director and Chief Planning Officer" shall be substituted.
- (ii) in column No 1 in Category (3), for the expression "Deputy Director including Chief Planning Officer", the expression "Deputy Director" shall be substituted.
- 3. For rule 6, the following rule shall be substituted, namely:-
- "6. Minimum Service:

No member of the service shall be eligible for promotion to the next higher category of the post or appointment by transfer, unless he/she is an approved probationer and has put in two(2) years of service after the date of commencement of his/her probation in the category from which promotion or appointment by transfer is made".
